A total of 8,798 Naloxone kits were been purchased through the STR grant for distribution to law enforcement agencies in year one of the grant. The total reversals in Arizona by first responders is 5,649; however, it uncertain how many of those can be directly attributed to STR vs. ongoing efforts by EMT not funded through STR. Arizona also currently has a community distribution project that has distributed over 45,000 kits into since January 2017 and had 3,908 reported reversals. This project is not funded through STR, but substantial efforts are made in all STR education and training to make the community and providers aware of the availability of Naloxone through the distribution project or through the statewide standing order.

Arizona has launched a real-time auto-dispatch model with Phoenix Fire Department; when PFD receives and opioid-related call, a peer support from the Phoenix 24/7 OTP is also dispatched to arrive on the scene and try to help navigate the individuals to resources. Arizona has also launched its first law enforcement "pre-booking" model in Tucson. Peers are called on scene to provide navigation to the 24/7 OTP as a mechanism for an incarceration alternative.
