ADHS continues to distribute naloxone to law enforcement agencies across the state, as well as other community organizations such as colleges and high schools, faith based community, and organizations serving special populations. In STR Year 2 ADHS provided 3,457 kits to 45 agencies. Arizona also has a community distribution project that has distributed over 111,304 kits into since January 2017 and had 6,989 reported reversals. This project is not funded through STR, but substantial efforts are made in all STR education and training to make the community and providers aware of the availability of Naloxone through the distribution project or through the statewide standing order.

Arizona has increased efforts for early identifications of MAT eligible individuals re-entering communities from correctional setting. Working with local jails in identified "hotspots" to streamline care coordination and connection to peer supports and OUD treatment for individuals with OUD upon re-entry to the community. Central and Southern regions of Arizona implement "reach-in" model for these efforts, whereas rural Northern Arizona uses a blended "reach-in" and "reach-out" model to better meet the needs.
