

Medicaid School Based Claiming (MSBC)

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Arizona Medicaid School-Based Claiming Program

- Arizona participates in two Medicaid reimbursement programs for school based services, the Direct Service Claiming (DSC) program and the Medicaid Administrative Claiming (MAC) program.
- These two school-based programs assist participating school districts, referred to as Local Education Agencies (LEAs), including charter schools and the Arizona School for the Deaf and Blind (ASDB), by reimbursing them for their costs to provide Medicaid covered services to eligible students.
- The purpose of the DSC Program is to allow LEAs to receive reimbursement for the cost to provide Medicaid covered medical services to Title XIX eligible students.
- The purpose of the MAC program is to allow LEAs to receive reimbursement for Medicaid administrative outreach activities that are done routinely within the school setting.



Arizona Medicaid School-Based Claiming Program (cont...)

- The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) is the federal agency that oversees these two school-based programs. In Arizona, these programs are overseen by the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS), Arizona's Medicaid agency.
- AHCCCS contracts with a Third Party Administrator (TPA), PCG, to administer both the DSC and MAC programs.

Behavioral Health in Schools

- Students in Arizona who receive Title XIX and XXI medical benefits can access behavioral health services in the school setting. AHCCCS, primarily through its contracted Managed Care Organizations (MCOs), helps school administrators and leaders connect with behavioral health providers statewide to meet their students' needs.
- While schools have historically been approved settings for Medicaid-covered behavioral health services, in 2018 \$3 million in state General Fund dollars were appropriated to expand behavioral health services in schools
- \$1 million of this funding is being used in a partnership with the Arizona Department of Education to provide mental health training to schools and school districts.
- The remaining dollars are matched with Federal Funds to generate \$10 million in Medicaid funding to AHCCCS health plans to bring established behavioral health providers into the school setting, meet Medicaid-eligible students where they are and where they have health needs, and pay for Medicaid-covered behavioral health services in schools.

State Efforts to Implement the Free Care Policy Reversal

- AHCCCS is pursuing changes to the MSBC program recognizing the growing need to provide health services and support to children where they spend the majority of their time - in school.
- Historically, the CMS guidance on "free care" was that Medicaid payments were not available for Medicaid covered services if the same services were provided to all students free of charge. In schools this translated most frequently to services such as hearing and vision screenings, or nursing services available to all students.
- In 2014, CMS issued a State Medicaid director letter reversing the long standing free care policy. This change allows states more flexibility in their school-based Medicaid programs by allowing school districts to bill Medicaid for health services delivered to all Medicaid-enrolled children, not just those with a special education plan documented by an Individualized Education Program (IEP)



State Efforts to Implement the Free Care Policy Reversal (cont...)

- Implementing the free care policy reversal is one pathway to increasing children's access to Medicaid services.
- In order to implement this change, Arizona needs to submit a state plan amendment (SPA) to CMS.

Jul – Dec 2019 Conduct work groups to identify transformation opportunities and outline changes

Jan – Feb 2020 • Draft SPA Language and prepare program transformation documentation



Transformation Timeline (cont...)

March 2020

- Present SPA at Tribal Consultation
- Begin 45 day public comment period
- Ensure LEAs are engaged during public comment period

Apr – Sept 2020

- Submit SPA to CMS
- Update systems with changes
- Community engagement and LEA training

Oct 2020

• Effective date = October 1, 2020 following CMS approval.
